Funding Programs



Small Community Planning Grant

- Engineering Study/Facilities Plan Development
- Limited to systems less than 2,500
- Pays 80% of cost of study, up to:
 - \$8,000 for water studies
 - \$10,000 for wastewater studies



State Water Plan

Water and wastewater projects seeking DANR Funding must be on the State Water Plan

- One-page application form
- Preliminary engineering report or facilities plan
- Eligibility & Priority Point Selfassessment (drinking water projects only)



Consolidated Program

- State Program
- Grants and Loans
- Primary Types of Projects Funded
 - □Drinking Water
 - □Wastewater
 - ☐ Watershed protection (non-point source pollution remediation
 - **□**Stormwater



Consolidated Program

Eligible Applicants

- ☐ Cities
- Counties
- ☐ Federally recognized Indian tribes
- ☐ Districts (sanitary, water users, etc.)
- ☐ Non-profits organized to provide water or wastewater services



Solid Waste Management Program

- State Program
- Grants and Loans
- Projects must address one of the following Solid Waste Management Hierarchy areas
 - □Volume reduction at source
 - □Recycling and reuse
 - □Use for energy production
 - □Disposal in landfill or combustion for volume reduction



Solid Waste Management Program

Eligible Applicants

- □ Individuals
- □ Partnerships
- ☐ Limited Liability Companies
- □ Corporations
- ☐ Cities
- **□**Counties
- ☐ Federally recognized Indian tribes
- ☐ Special purpose districts with the authority to construct or operate solid waste, tire waste or recycling facilities.



State Revolving Fund Programs

Low-Interest Loan Programs

- Clean Water (CWSRF)
- Drinking Water (DWSRF)
- Federal programs requiring state match
- Funds come from many sources
 - Federal Capitalization Grants
 - Issuance of bonds
 - Repayments from borrowers
 - Interest earned on un-loaned funds
 - Transfers between SRF programs



State Revolving Fund Programs

Eligible Applicants

- ☐ Cities
- ☐ Counties
- ☐ Federally recognized Indian tribes
- ☐ Districts (sanitary, water user, etc.)
- ☐ Non-profits organized to provide **water** services (non-profits are **not** eligible for CWSRF program)



ARPA

- The BWNR has awarded over \$693 million in grants to water and wastewater projects across the state
- Most projects have a SRF loan attached to the funding package
- Funds must be disbursed by December 31, 2026.
 - Over \$460 million already disbursed.



Application Deadlines

Small Community Planning Grants

☐ Applications accepted anytime

State Water Plan

- □October 1st
- ☐ Amendment applications- 1st of February, May, or August

Funding Applications

☐ 1st of January, April, July, or October



Award Process

- Staff reviews applications and determines appropriate funding package recommendations
- Staff presents recommendations to the Board of Water and Natural Resources (BWNR)
- 3. BWNR takes action and awards funding to recipients
- 4. DANR staff works with applicants to close loans and complete other necessary requirements for the project



CWSRF Eligible Projects

- All Publicly Owned Treatment Works (POTW)
 - Mechanical or land-based WWTF
 - Wastewater collection and conveyance
 - Lift Stations
- Storm water management for water quality benefit (gray and green)
 - Drainage and flood control projects are ineligible
- Nonpoint source (NPS) improvements
- Green Project Reserve (GPR)



DWSRF Eligible Projects

- Most water storage, treatment, distribution, and source development
- Domestic use; not industrial use
- Cannot fund projects primarily for future growth or fire protection



Useful Life

Term of the loan can not exceed the useful life of the project.

30-Year Eligible

- ☐ Pipes
- □ Valves
- □ Fittings
- Water Storage Reservoirs
- ☐ Lagoon/Wetland WWTFs
- □ Non-mechanical components of water or wastewater treatment systems



Useful Life

Not 30 year Eligible

- ☐ Lift stations
- Booster stations
- Mechanical components of water or wastewater treatment systems
- ☐ Water meters (10- to 15-year useful life)

What if a project has several components with different useful lives?

Staff conducts a case-by-case evaluation to determine when the components with a 10- or 20-year useful life are paid off.



Interest Rates

- Rates are established by the Board of Water and Natural Resources
- Last updated June 2024

Subsidy is provided as:

- **□**Grants
- □Principal Forgiveness on SRF loans

Common Questions:

How do I get grant funding?

Where do my rates have to be to get a grant?



Who can receive subsidy?

CWSRF:

- Subsidy only available to communities that meet affordability criteria
- Availability Criteria
 - -MHI less than 95% of the State MHI, OR
 - -MHI between 95% and 105% of State MHI AND community has a declining population AND community is in a county with the unemployment rate greater than statewide unemployment rate
- Rates required for subsidy consideration:
 - \$45/resident user/month based on 5,000 gallon usage



Who can receive subsidy?

DWSRF:

- 14% of Capitalization Grant from EPA available to all borrowers
- 12%-35% available only to Disadvantage Communities
- Disadvantage Community (ARSD 74:05:11:01(8))
 - Municipalities and Sanitary Districts
 - MHI is below the state MHI, AND
 - \$45/resident user/month based on 5,000 gallon usage
 - Other Applicants
 - MHI is below the state MHI, AND
 - \$70/resident user/month based on 7,000 gallon usage
- Rates required for subsidy consideration:
 Must meet the rates outlined in the Disadvantage Community definition



Meeting minimum rate and eligibility criteria is NO guarantee of receiving subsidy!



Grant vs. Principal Forgiveness

Your community is awarded \$1,000,000 loan with 20% principal forgiveness not to exceed \$200,000.

What does this mean?



- 20% of the loan amount will be "forgiven" on each disbursement request
- If \$1,000,000 drawn, principal to be repaid is \$800,000 and interest payments are based on that amount
- If \$600,000 drawn
 - PF = \$600,000 X 0.2 = \$120,000;
 - Amount repaid is \$480,000
- Principal Forgiveness is similar to a grant
- SRF funding is federal dollars. In federal terminology a "grant" has specific reporting requirements.
 Principal forgiveness is used to provide subsidy without additional requirements for borrowers.
